Role of the Corporate Governance Committee

The Otter Tail Corporation Corporate Governance Committee conducts an annual review of political contributions and lobbying activities under our Political Contributions and Lobbying Policy (“Policy”). This Committee is responsible for providing recommendations to the Board if there is a desired change to the process or Policy.

2025 Review

Ballot Measure Campaign Contributions

No corporate funds were given to a ballot measure campaign, and no corporate funds were used to advocate for or against a ballot measure in 2025.

Candidate Campaign Contributions

No corporate funds were given to individual political campaigns, and no corporate funds were used to advocate for or against a candidate in 2025.

Political Action Committees

Otter Tail Power Company has established one state and one combined state and federal Political Action Committee (“PAC”) and is compliant with reporting all PAC receipts and donations. Each PAC has a board or steering committee responsible for reviewing and approving federal, state and local political contribution requests. All PAC activities (including solicitation and contributions to parties and candidates) are governed and overseen by their respective governing bodies.

Trade Association Dues and Lobbying Expenses

Contributions to Trade Associations

Otter Tail Corporation, and its operating companies, belong to various trade associations, many of which are organizations operating under Section 501(c)(4) or (6) of the Internal Revenue Code. Certain of these trade associations engage in lobbying activities, advocating for the interests of the respective industry or broader business community. We report below the portion of trade association dues used for lobbying purposes.

Regulatory and Legislative Direct Lobbying Expenses

Otter Tail Corporation has a responsibility to participate in the formation of sound public policies to protect the interests of the company and its stakeholders. As a result, we engage with legislators and regulators on a wide range of topics that could impact our electric utility operations. Funds expended for legislative lobbying are not recovered from electric consumers in rates.

The amounts reported reflect direct lobbying expenditures by the electric utility, exclusive of amounts paid for lobbying costs as part of annual trade association dues, which are included in the previous table.

¹ We do not meet the threshold for qualifying as a federal lobbyist and the amounts here only reflect external lobbying costs and do not include Otter Tail Power Company's internal labor costs.

² Under Minnesota law, lobbying includes attempting to influence either legislation or "administrative action" as defined by Minnesota law. "Administrative action" includes costs incurred for rate proceedings, siting dockets and certificates of need. The amounts reported for Minnesota reflect external lobbying costs as well as Otter Tail Power Company's internal labor costs related to lobbying as defined under Minnesota law. In 2025, a significant amount of lobbying expenses were incurred in connection with a Minnesota rate case filed in October, applications for certificates of need and related routing/siting permits for multiple transmission lines in which Otter Tail Power Company is an owner and an application for a certificate of need for a solar generation facility.

³ The amounts reported for North Dakota reflect only external lobbying costs and do not include Otter Tail Power Company's internal labor costs.

⁴ The amounts reported for South Dakota reflect only external lobbying costs and do not include Otter Tail Power Company's internal labor costs.
